What People Borrowed in 2023



Patrons borrowed a total of 55,244 items in 2023—an average of about 151 items per day. Borrowing is not limited to the hours the library is open, as our digital collections are available 24/7/365.

In 2023, children's fiction books topped the most-borrowed list with 16,747 items checked out. This figure includes picture books, juvenile fiction, and young adult fiction. Electronic materials came in second with 13,667 loans of digital books, audiobooks, and magazines. Adult fiction came in third with 9,063 loans.

The library's collection consists of 152,804 items, including 33,930 youth books, 66,794 adult titles, 4,675 DVDs, and 3,396 audiobooks on CD. In addition, patrons have access to 38,663 electronic items. We added 5,118 items to our collections in 2023.

Some exciting non-book additions to our collection in 2023 included fishing poles, Adventure Passes to local attractions, and 6 ukuleles, which can be checked out just like other library materials!

Community Outreach




This year, the library was able to reach many new faces through different and renewed outreach opportunities. We resumed our regular deliveries of Large Print titles to Manor Hills as well as helping to stock the library at the Allegany County Jail.

We were pleased to maintain several other vital community partnerships, as well.

The library continued working with WCSD to distribute free lunches to kids on weekdays throughout the summer and with Community Kitchen in offering a monthly community meal. We partnered with Rotary Club of Wellsville to host a community Easter Egg Hunt and with the Allegany County Blind Associ-

In 2023, the library launched a new bi-weekly podcast and radio show where staff members

share favorite books, movies, recipes and more. The show is called *But Have You Tried* and is available on all podcast apps, our YouTube channel and airs locally on 92.7 FM.

With storytime visits to Trinity Daycare, AC-CORD Headstart, and the YMCA afterschool program, the library is connecting with more and more children. We also had the opportunity to have a table at the first annual Community Family Fun Day where families were able to

browse local free resources. All elementary grades were able to visit again for a Summer Reading run down and library tour!



In 2023, there were several new, ongoing programs offered including monthly game nights, knitting circles, and The Adult Pride Alliance. The Adult Pride Alliance started in March of 2023, and was able to grow its membership enough to end the year with a big "Friendsgiving" dinner!



We also offered our first ever Poetry Slam contest to celebrate National Poetry Month. Patrons turned out to listen to contestants read their poems. Gift certificates were awarded to the three most popular. Alongside the regular adult

craft club, SerenHippity Crafts, from Olean, offered two additional craft classes for adults in 2023: a house plant instruction and craft and a jewelry-

making craft. Heather Joyce returned to offer another 6-week yoga class and we hosted several authors from the surrounding area, including Gerald Borchert, Steven Jakobi, T.R. Sherlock, Dylan Newton, and Amanda Woomer.



Tuesdays on the Terrace, one of our most enduringly popular adult programs, ran





August, serving well over 100 lunches per week! The Wellsville Village Farmer's Market was back offering locally grown food and handcrafted goods on the library lawn each Saturday from June

through September. They also held a holiday market as part of

the kick-off to the Hometown Holidays season on Small Business Saturday. The library even stayed open late so patrons could view the Wellsville Area Chamber of Commerce fireworks show from the back terrace!



The Nancy Howe Auditorium & Howe Gallery

In January 2023, Kate Elliott joined library staff as the Public Programming and Exhibits Curator. Her role includes planning programming in the Nancy Howe Auditorium and Howe Gallery.

During her first year at the library, Kate oversaw a slate of programming that included perennial favorites, like Irish Band Emerald Isle and Genesee Dance Theatre performing Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Ballet, as well as performers making their DAHPL debuts, like pianist Judd Sunshine and dynamic painting-and-piano-duo Pock-



et Vinyl. Program highlights included the turnout for our first ever screening of Rocky Horror Picture Show and the incredible Bubblemania! show, by Doug Rougeux, that was a fun addition to our summer reading activities. Also, after years of planning, the auditorium patio was refurbished to improve accessibility and safety; molded concrete pavers replaced the previously slick and broken stone and the turnaround at the end of the wheelchair ramp was expanded.



In the Howe Gallery, we had a variety of art displays. In April, David Kuranda, a local art collector, hung over 150 original paintings. Student shows organized by WCSD and ICS followed in May and June. A fall highlight was the a spooky photography show—From the Shadows.

pragons Club! The club started as a small group in the fall of 2021, but grew to a record high of 14 in the summer of 2023–large enough that we had to split into three groups to play! The D&D Club celebrated Halloween by designing and wearing costumes based on their game characters.

Some highlights from teen programming in 2023 were the second annual Trivia Easter Egg Hunt, a photography class taught by Brian Oglesbee, and the second annual Too-Old-to-Trick-or-Treat Halloween Party! In September we also held our first ever Live-Action Clue, where teens took on the roles of the classic clue characters and roamed the library after hours to look for clues.





In November we held the library's 11th annual Teen Photography Show, sponsored by the Wellsville Rotary Club, and judged by local photographer, Brian Oglesbee. We received 91 entries to the photo show, had 75 people come for the reception, and 271 community votes for the People's Choice Award! This award went to went to Olivia Palmiter for the photograph "Zuri." The Best of Show Award

went to August Sparatta for the photograph "Dazed and Confused."

We also continued to update our Young Adult reading room with a hand painted solar system, by Isabel Crowner, and a game station with Xbox and PS3 for teens to play in the library!



Children's Programming

The children's department has been a hub of activity ranging from old favorites, like storytimes and the Fancy Tea, to reinvigorated programs, such as the Pirate Party and Halloween Party!

Our storytimes continue to entertain families with themes, such as alphabet storytime, Pete the Cat, and spring, that allow us to explore books, and our world, through color, texture, shapes and music! These are all very important tools for developing early literacy skills in children, as well as a lifelong love of reading. We also enjoy play time at every storytime because play is work for children. We always work on our fine motor skills like building, twisting, and pinching items, as well as our gross motor skills like jumping and running! Over the course of 2023 we had 1,000 participants in about one hundred storytimes!



Every year, the Fancy Tea shows just how classy library kids can be. In 2023, we hosted a Fairy Tale Tea Party where children got gussied up to make shields or tiaras,







decorate their own "mirror mirror," and enjoy a horsedrawn carriage ride. The Friends of the Library help fund this event, and Miss Kate and her volunteers make it come to life. We love to be able to provide the community with free programming such as this to give children new and exciting experiences.

Our Pirate Party has been a big hit for the past couple of years. One new addition that has been a huge crowd pleaser is having Master Swordsman Wayne Welburn join us to teach proper sword fighting technique! This year we also made our own treasure maps, and followed clues around the library to find the hidden treasure! Kids of all ages had a swashbuckling good time!

The Halloween Party is one that always has the building bursting at the seams. This year we were graced with an appearance from a local group of witches who entertained not only the kids, but also the adults in attendance, with a choreographed dance! We played bingo and enjoyed snacks in costume the rest of the night.



All Together Now Summer Reading Program



Along with lots of books read, participating kids had many opportunities throughout the summer to enjoy fun and educational programs based on teamwork, community, and cohabitation.
