What People Borrowed in 2022



Patrons borrowed a total of 54,550 items in 2022—an average of 123 items per day. Patrons are not limited to borrowing only when the library is open, as our digital collections are available 24/7 year round.

In 2022, children's fiction books were the most borrowed items in the library's collection with 18,562. This includes picture books, juvenile fiction, and young adult fiction. Adult fiction came in second with 12,324 loans. Electronic materials came in third with 11, 242 loans. This includes digital books, audiobooks, and magazines.

The library's collection consists of 147,686 items, including 34,306 youth books, 66,210 adult titles, 4,500 DVDs, and 3,363 audiobooks on CD. In addition, patrons have access to 22,001 e-books. The library added 2,989 items to its collections in 2022.

Library Programs & Outreach Services

Once again we participated in the summer lunch program through the school, providing free lunches to kids during weekdays throughout the summer. We



continued our partnership with the Allegany County Jail by providing them with a fresh batch of books for their in-house library. We also worked closely with the Allegany County Blind Association, hosting a "Craft for a Cause" program and participating in their "See All You Can See" information fair. In September we partnered with the League of Women Voters to help register community members to vote.

Howe's Things, the library's podcast and radio show, continued to provide connection to the library for those near and far. We covered several topics including literary awards, Banned Books Week, Poetry month and more. We also featured many guests including library staff, volunteers and directors from around the system. Plus we had several interviews including author Dylan Newton, artist Mike Vosburg and Winsome Bingham, author of the award-winning children's book Soul Food Sunday.

In addition to our frequent visits to local daycares for storytime, the youth department has been able to help reach children by handing out books at the Rotary Dinner as well as all of our seasonal events held on the front lawn. We are also proud to announce that all the grades in the Elementary School were able to come and take a tour with Miss Kate and visit the art show while it was on exhibit at the library!

At the end of 2021 Jessica Wieszczyk stepped down from the role of Auditorium Coordinator, having served in that capacity since 2019. We are thankful for all Jess brought to the job and are glad she stayed on in the circulation department.

For 2022, Daphne O'Kelly stepped into the role in an interim capacity and oversaw a slate of programming that included an array of perennial favorites including Emerald Isle, The Young Sisters and The Rock N Roll Pet Show.



We also had an increased focus on dance with workshops from the Genesee Country Village (19th Century Dance) and Devi Bollywood Performing Arts and performances including Always the Hour from Annie Wilson and The Nutcracker from Genesee Dance Theatre.

We took a dive into Summer Reading this year with our "Oceans of Possibilities" Theme. The children's program had a record breaking number of participants: 235 kids between the ages of zero and ten! Children had the opportunity to explore different fun and educational water themed activities such as raft building, beach slime, and live turtles!

One of the highlights of our 2022 Summer Reading Program was definitely the Ice Cream Taste Test that was held at Sugardaddy's! Fifty children were able to sample a small portion of 8 different flavors of ice cream and then vote for their favorite. We were also fortunate to have Yoga at the library by Heather Lynn as well as a visit from local hot air balloonist Vickie Nydegger Ketchner!

As always the generosity of our community is never-ending. Kids who stop by the library once a week earn a small prize of either a book, a snack, or a coupon. Our coupons are generously donated by local businesses such as Texas Hot, Napoli Pizza, Shorts, McDonalds, Burger King, and 7-Eleven. These kids definitely had their fill of ice cream!

Our Teen Summer Reading Program featured activity trackers for teens

to keep track of books read, time spent outside, and creative activities.









We were pleased to have 58 teens sign up for the program this year. We kept busy with ocean crafts and activities, as well as plenty of times to just hang out and relax in the teen loft! Some highlights from the summer were playing Twister with paint, having a water balloon fight on the library's lawn, and hunting for hidden bags of treats in the stacks.



The adult summer reading program offered a variety of programs, including yoga on the front lawn, craft classes, book clubs, Tasty Tuesdays cooking club, trivia contests, and an author visit from Dylan Newton. Everyone who registered received a spe-

cially designed summer reading tote bag. Weekly \$25 gift certificates were awarded each week, as well as a grand prize drawing for a Tablet.

Local establishments also served up some delicious lunches for Tuesdays on the Terrace! Plus we were pleased to welcome back Music on the Lawn with concerts presented by the MOTL Committee. It was a great summer!
